



Statistics on Income and Living Conditions (SILC)

Description

SILC (Statistics on Income and Living Conditions) is a survey that has been conducted by the Federal Statistical Office, commissioned by the Federal Council, since 2007. The annual survey on household income and living conditions collects information on a wide range of topics allowing it to take both an objective and subjective look at the multidimensional aspects of living conditions in Switzerland. The data collected are both cross-sectional (relating to a given period or moment in time) and longitudinal (relating to changes at individual level, observed over a period of four years). This information enables a description to be made of the social and economic conditions of life in Switzerland and a better understanding of what influences them. The survey is conducted in over 30 countries throughout Europe, enabling the Swiss results to be compared with those of other countries.

Methodology

Sample survey of approximately 8,000 households comprising 18,000 persons. SILC is a telephone survey. You have been randomly selected from the FSO's sample register. The FSO's sample register is primarily based on the official communal and cantonal population registers. To facilitate initial contact, the sample is completed wherever possible by telephone numbers that telephone operators have to make available to the FSO in compliance with the Federal Statistics Act. This list contains also includes private landline numbers that are not found in the public telephone directory. Persons participating in the survey are questioned for several consecutive years.

Statistical basis and survey units:

Permanent resident population living in private households (incl. non-permanent residents living in a household with at least one permanent resident). Information on social exclusion and housing conditions is collected at household level whereas information on labour, education and health is obtained from persons aged 16 and over.

Policy on revisions

Methodological revisions to improve the quality and accuracy of the estimates are applied every 5 to 10 years or when new opportunities arise such as the availability of a new sampling frame.

From SILC 2017: Revision of the longitudinal weighting

From SILC 2015: Revision of the health deprivation concept

From SILC 2014: Change in survey basis and revision of the cross-sectional weightings

From SILC 2014: Revision of the household type
